### **Council & Boards Update**

March 2017 Meeting

CIHT Council is made up mainly of elected ordinary members and regional representatives. They act as the decision making body for the CIHT, delivering the strategy, business plans and outputs on behalf of the membership. Council generally meets four times per year.

CIHT welcomed former Paralympian swimmer and multiple gold medal winner Christopher Holmes, to our March meeting. Now a life peer, Lord Holmes recounted his early experiences of not allowing his sight loss to hinder his swimming training and ambitions. As well as being a trained solicitor, Lord Holmes has fought tirelessly for disability and equality rights; as an inspiring speaker he discussed how we can improve inclusivity in our industry, challenging CIHT to lead the way with its developing diversity and inclusion toolkit.

Our CEO, Sue Percy, followed up Lord Holmes' talk with an excellent discussion on unconscious bias, and how it influences our professional and personal lives, to a significant degree. Within working groups, Council discussed how we can recognise when we, or others, are using unconscious bias, and how best to mitigate against it. It's an issue that CIHT takes very seriously, and will further develop through its diversity and inclusion toolkit, and other activities.

Other activities at the meeting, including the endorsement of Certificates of Merit, to individuals having made an outstanding contribution to CIHT, and to the Young Professional Award for 2017. Nominations were also considered for Honorary Fellowships, and for the role of Vice President, for 2017-18.

# 2017-18 Events Programme

The new 2017-18 session is upon us, and with it a whole host of technical seminars, visits, events and socials to keep our members informed and socially active throughout the year.

In late June, we are visiting the New Wear Crossing once again, to catch up on progress of the bridge and road infrastructure; in August a visit is planned to Silverlink junction, where a 'triple decker' junction will bury the A19 under the current roundabout, with the A1058 coast road at the top.

On the seminars front, we have a talk on human factors in transport planning, scheduled for July; in August we welcome members of CIHT South East to talk about projects in that region and, in September, we will re-run the excellent talk on rebuilding the A591 after devastating storm damage, to members in Cumbria. Socially, we're looking to join up more with our sister institutions, and a late summer barbecue event is planned in September with the local branch of the RTPI.

Looking ahead, we are launching an exciting programme of seminars entitled "A Short Introduction to..." with a broad range of topics to boost your CPD and professional portfolios.

# A Day in the Life of...

# David Auld Senior Consultant, Jacobs



#### Terms of reference

My background is mainly based in traffic engineering and road safety through my experience in both scheme design and road safety audit, on projects of various sizes for local authority clients. More recently I have supported on a number of strategic transport modelling projects, such as the A1 in Northumberland, where I have coordinated the production of Highways England PCF report deliverables. Due to my varied experience I wouldn't describe myself as having a particular main specialism, which I view as a positive as it enables me to get involved in a wide variety of projects and broaden my knowledge.

### Suitability for the job

After completing an HNC in Civil Engineering early in my career, I progressed into a Traffic Engineer role and developed an interest in road safety, which led to me undertaking courses in road safety and accident investigation and prevention from Newcastle and Aston Universities. I also hold the PRINCE2 Practitioner project management qualification and recently achieved Incorporated Engineer status through the CIHT. In 2016 I was delighted to win the Young Professional of the Year award for the CIHT North East and Cumbria region.

### Where based

I'm based in our office on the Newcastle Quayside, a location which has its perks for a couple of sociable drinks after a week of hard work!

### Transport to work

By car to the Newcastle office, or by train when working from our Leeds and Manchester offices.

### Top of In-tray

Outside of my day-to-day project work I am leading the apprentice initiative in Transport Planning at Jacobs, where I am currently overseeing the recruitment and development of apprentices in Transport Planning across our offices in the North and Midlands. As part of this role I'm also currently busy arranging STEM events with local schools to promote our apprentice career opportunities.

### Best aspects of the job

The sense of pride and achievement from seeing a project I've work on come to life. The most recent example is the newly-opened Metrolink Second City Crossing tram line in Manchester, which I have worked on for the last three years. I'm also lucky enough to work in a fantastic team with a bunch of skilled, supportive and friendly colleagues who are a pleasure to work alongside (here's hoping they would say the same about me!)

### Worst aspect

Having recently become more involved in supporting on bids for new projects and opportunities, I've learnt how disappointing it can be when the outcome isn't successful after working hard to pull together a good quality tender. However, it's a great learning process and the disappointment gets balanced out by the sense of satisfaction on the occasions when the outcome is positive and we secure an exciting new project.

### What is the most important transport issue today

With many nationally significant and major transport/infrastructure projects on the horizon I think the skills shortage within the transport planning industry remains a key issue to tackle. Not doing so could potentially hinder our ability to deliver these projects. The uncertainty caused by Brexit, in terms of our ability to attract talent from overseas, could also exacerbate the issue over the next few years. However, as an industry I feel we are slowly getting better at raising awareness of careers in our line of work and have made positive steps in creating opportunities through the recent introduction of the Transport Planning Apprenticeship course, which is backed by the CIHT. We need to continue to do more though.

### How do you relax

I'm a keen footballer and play regular 5-a-side since hanging up my boots from 11-a-side football, which I enjoyed playing to a good standard for many years. When not playing football I like to get to the gym to train a few times a week. My interest in fitness is essential to balance out the fact that I'm a massive foodie and enjoy nights out to sample the latest restaurants in and around Newcastle, as well as trying my hand cooking at home. I also like a good catch-up with friends usually by going out to watch a Newcastle game, a boxing match or taking in a gig/live music.

### Ambition
